MEET THE MEMBERS


This month's profile is of Camilla Yahnke, director on the SHS Board for a second year. Camilla is a floral design & specimen entrant and also a judge of the same classes.


T N - How did you become interested in gardening?

Herbs & other useful plants - Hermina Hubert



There is a plant whose broad leaves look very much out of place amongst the blades of the grass. Many of us poke and dig and pull at it because...it's a WEED! I must say that am responsible for having eradicated said plant in the past. But I recently found a book on HERBS that informs us about the usefulness of a variety of plants (some traditional herbs, some not).

The Greater Plantain (Plantago major ssp.major) contains the same active substances that the pharmaceutical industry extracts from the Ribwort Plantain. These are used in cough mixtures, bactericides, and homeopathic medicine. The fresh leaves can be rubbed on insect bites to relieve itch and pain. The tannin in the leaves hardens skin and people once placed them in their boots to prevent sore feet on long treks.

Do not harvest them for your summer salad, however. Dandelion, yes...plantain, no! Not all herbs are edible; some are culinary herbs, but there are also many plants that are simply used for their ability to heal externally, in some way.

How Does My Garden Grow?

I'm writing this on the first full day of spring, as I hear steady rain falling on the metal roof above me. The snow outside is rapidly receding and I glance at my rose enclosure wondering how well the roses have fared. It has been a strange winter, playing horse shoes in the backyard on Christmas Day, and taking long leisurely walks well after January 1. One of those walks led me to the rose enclosure and I dared a peek. All was well, with the plants properly dormant, and I breathed a sigh of relief. Within the next few weeks it will be time for them to wake up and welcome spring.

Meanwhile, my thoughts are on full summer, as I design and redesign my rose garden. Rule #1 about rose gardening is that there is always room for one more. Rule #2 is if there is room for one more, you can fit two. So check out our "Web site of the Month" on the previous page if you are interested in purchasing roses. This web site is a very comprehensive site that will link to other informative sources. Everything at your fingertips. If you are planning a spring mail order, be sure to get your orders in now. Most nurseries have a deadline of early May, and are often sold out long before the deadline. If you prefer to purchase locally, again it is important

to shop early. Choose plants with healthy green stalks and leaf buds that have not yet or just opened.

Back to the task at hand, as soon as daytime temperatures, and sunlight increase, the enclosure needs to be vented. Carefully lift a corner at each end, to ensure air movement. Otherwise the enclosure will become a greenhouse and will make it difficult to harden off. If Jack Frost takes one more stab at winter, the enclosure can be easily sealed up again. Once the spring temperatures stay consistently above 0 deg. C., the insulation wrap can be removed. At this time, check the plants for any winter kill that should be removed. Apply granular rose fertilizer around each plant, gently working it into the moist soil......cont.

Drape a length of burlap over the enclosure frame to protect the plants from direct winds and sunlight for about one more week. The burlap will also provide some protection from a surprise frost.

Regular fertilizing with a liquid rose fertilizer, high in Phosphorus (middle number), should begin on the Victoria Day Weekend, and be continued with weekly applications until mid July. This will ensure a spectacular flush of blooms in time for the Rose Show. Be sure to check your yearbook!
